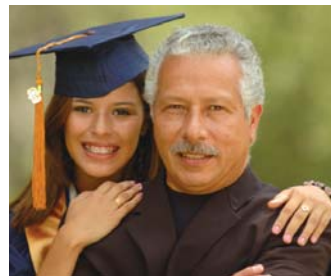

Phi Theta Kappa, founded in 1918, is recognized as the official honor society for two-year colleges by the American Association of Community Colleges. The Society has more than 1,200 chapters located worldwide. Nearly 100,000 students are inducted into Phi Theta Kappa each year.

- Access to Phi Theta Kappa's Career Resource Center

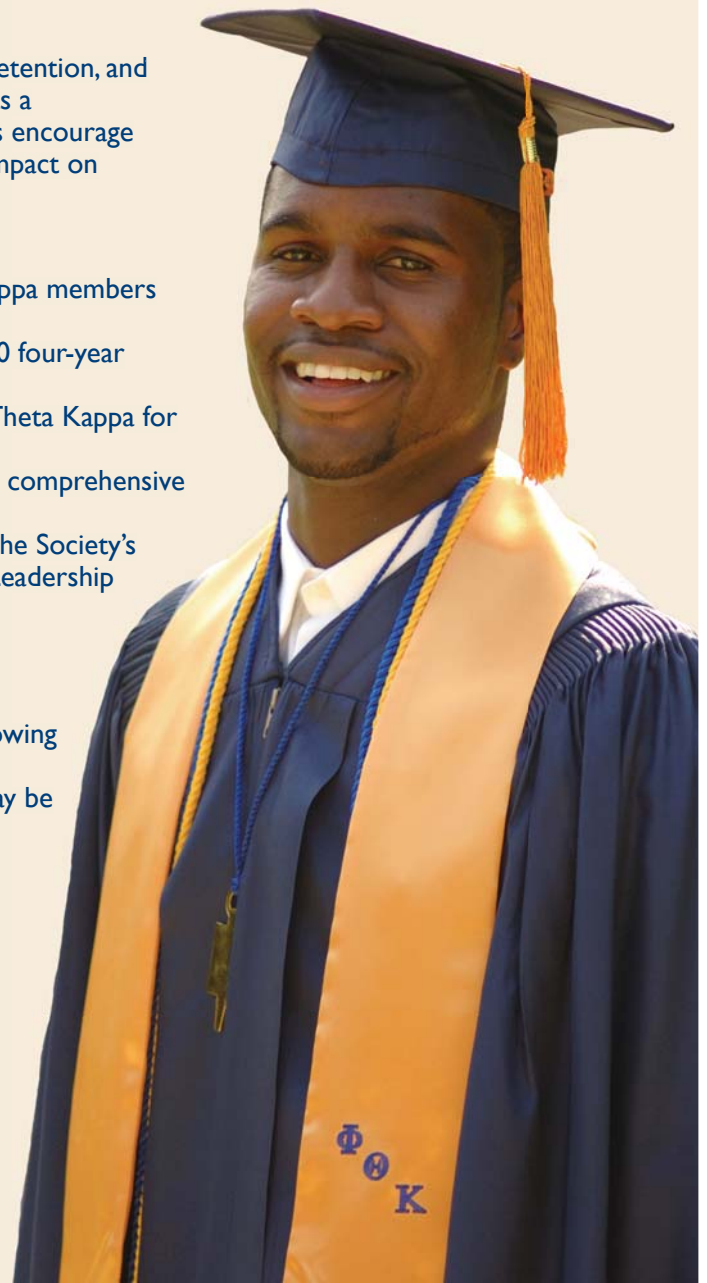
Who is eligible for membership in Phi Theta Kappa?

To be eligible for membership a student must meet the following eligibility requirements:

- Have completed at least 12 hours of coursework that may be applied to an associate degree
- Have a grade point average of generally 3.5

How can you help ensure students have these opportunities?

Studies show that students are 12 times more likely to accept the invitation to membership if they are encouraged by their college professors. Are your students achieving academic excellence?
